SUNDAY WORSHIP

Our Sunday Sermon Series will focus on our fall theme: Who Was Jesus, Anyway? Pastor Schroerlucke begins a series of messages focused on the latter chapters of the Gospel of Matthew. Many of these passages are the "Kingdom Parables" of Jesus that can give insight into the man behind the message.

Conflict, sin, discipline and order are nothing new for the church. What might Jesus say to the church of today that is continually confronted with disagreement and conflict? Pastor Schroerlucke looks at that question with a message, "Mending Fences." Our text will be Matthew 18:15-20. Musings

Jesus and Family

The note to myself read:

“Musings’ deadline coming. Remember fall theme: Who Was Jesus, Anyway?” But every time I thought of that, I also thought of the summer emphasis on church families. Since I couldn’t choose, I decided to combine.

My father could have told you who Jesus was in Swedish, one of the answers to the Lutheran catechism he learned from his grandfather. But he had long since come to believe that Jesus was, more than anything, a great moral teacher.

My mother would have said Jesus gave her comfort, spiritual guidance, a link to God for her personal life.

Her father, my grandfather, was a clergy person whose early ministry was to establish Sunday schools for unchurched children out in the Dakotas and Montana. “Jesus loves me. This I know.” was Grandpa Ferris’s favorite hymn and most closely-held tenet of faith.

Grandma Ferris, raising nine children mostly without her partner while he was out on his circuit, often could be heard humming “Jesus loves the little children” in later years, an example she sought to embody in her daily life, inviting all her children’s friends to share in their meager but healthy meals.

David (my husband) could use all the technical theological terms he learned in seminary to describe Jesus. He was very good at distilling these terms into language the untrained listener could engage. In the end, I think he would have described Jesus as a courageous revolutionary whose deep faith gave the world a living picture of God’s intention for our lives.

Certainly none of these descriptions is complete by itself. Each holds a piece of who this complex person, Jesus, was and is: teacher, comforter, one who accepts and includes, one who shows us the way to live. As I put these pieces together, I realized all over again that my own sense of who Jesus is came first through my family, then was expanded and refined and became my own. If Jesus had stayed in the Swedish Lutheran catechism, he wouldn’t be real for me.

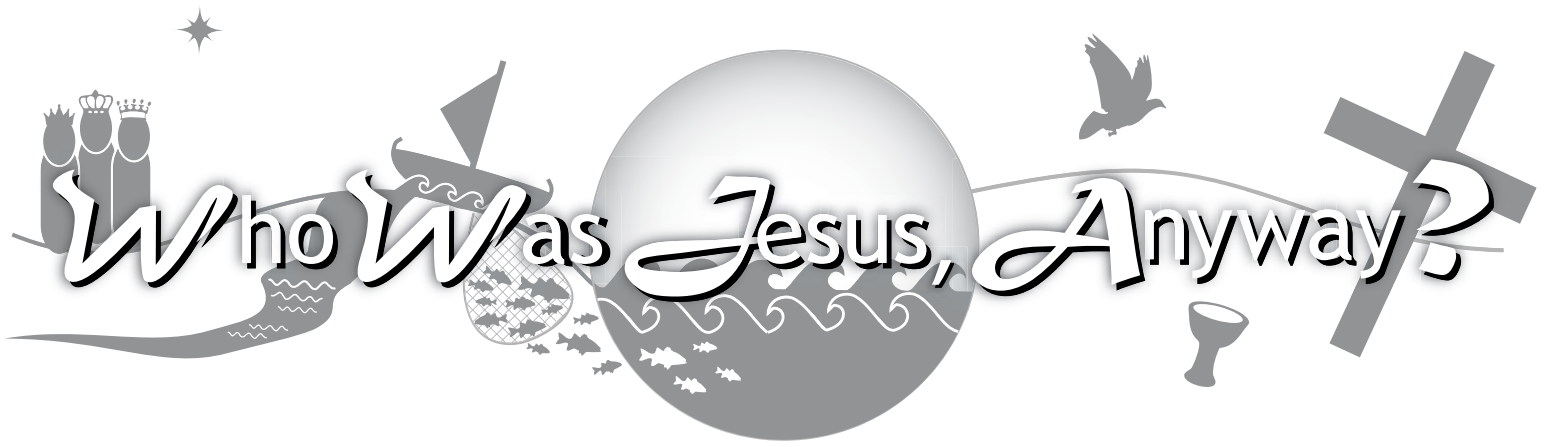
Let’s talk together about Jesus this fall.

An Invitation

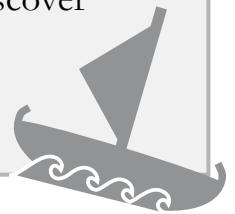

Hoover, C. McGaughey, Stephen J. Patterson, James M. Robinson, Bernard Brandon Scott, Mahlon H. Smith and Hal Taussig. Readers will see not Jesus, the icon of myth and creed, but a provocative young man of first-century Palestine whose vision and determination to live the vision gave birth to a new form of faith and changed the course of history.

Two Jewish Scholars Write About Jesus

With their expertise in the Aramaic/Hebrew-speaking world in which Jeshua han Nazri (Jesus' real Aramaic name) lived, David Flusser (d. 2001) of Hebrew University, Jerusalem and Geza Vermes, current emeritus at Oxford, have a unique contribution to make to the "Quest for the Historical Jesus," which began in Germany 233 years ago. Not having to struggle with a conservative/evangelical Christian upbringing, these scholars have been freer to engage the Jewish Jesus, about whom they have written for 30 years. Differing in temperament, they share a) an unabashed admiration for Jesus—"a religious genius" (Vermes) and b) the conviction that his distinctive teachings have decisive significance for both Jews and Christians today—indeed, for the whole world. "My ambition is simply to serve as a mouthpiece for Jesus' message today," says Flusser in his book's dedication. Together, these two works are a rich complement to the remarkable scholarship of the Jesus Seminar.

Kathleen E. Corley (Ph.D., Claremont Graduate School) is the Oshkosh Northwestern Distinguished Professor, University of Wisconsin—Oshkosh. A member of the Steering Committee of the Women and the Biblical World section of the Society of Biblical Literature, she is the author of *Women and the Historical Jesus* (2002), and *Maranatha: Women's Funerary Rituals and Christian Origins* (2010).



Bernard Brandon Scott (Ph.D., Vanderbilt University) is the Darbeth Distinguished Professor of New Testament at the Phillips Theological Seminary, Tulsa, OK. He is the author of several books, including *The Trouble with Resurrection* (2010) and *Re-Imagine the World* (2002).

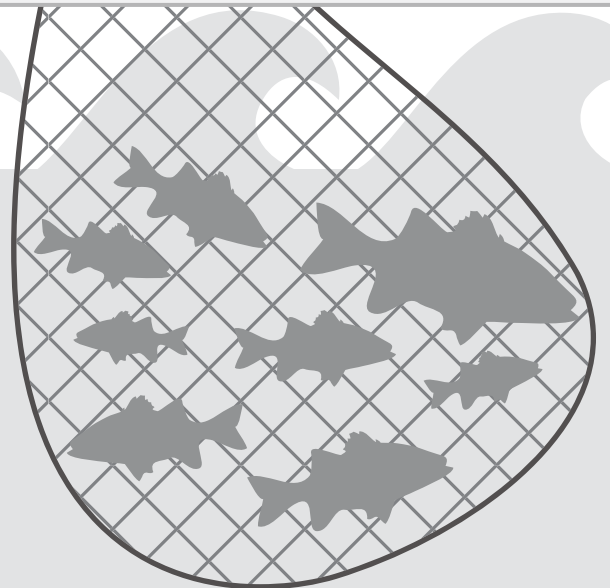

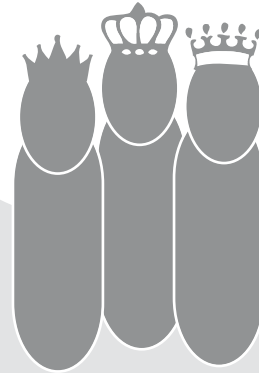
