# Musings

Last week I had the privilege of visiting the 9/11 Memorial site in New York City. It is stunningly beautiful in its grace and simplicity. It consists of two pools of cascading waterfalls, bordered by granite walls on which are carved the names of those who perished on that fateful day. As I walked around the site, I was struck by the juxtaposition of this quiet, peaceful space with the enormous cranes and loud construction noise that is going on nearby. Several new, very large buildings are being built now; they will eventually surround the memorial park. This stark contrast was profound: acknowledgement and commemoration of those who lost their lives, and the hustle and bustle of new construction. Construction that holds the prospect and promise of continued commerce. In other words, new life is emerging from a place of death and destruction. As I contemplated this scene, I was also reminded of a similar contrast. All around me were trees in the midst of their annual transition. Some had leaves in glorious shades of red, yellow and orange. Some had leaves that were brown and withered. Others were already bare. The seasonal cycle of death and dying has begun. But I know that this is not the end. My personal experiences of loss and “rebirth” lead me to understand death as something that can hold the promise of new life. The Creator, our God, has given us countless clues and illustrations of this truth. The 9/11 Memorial is a fitting reminder of this as well.

## Host an International Student for Thanksgiving

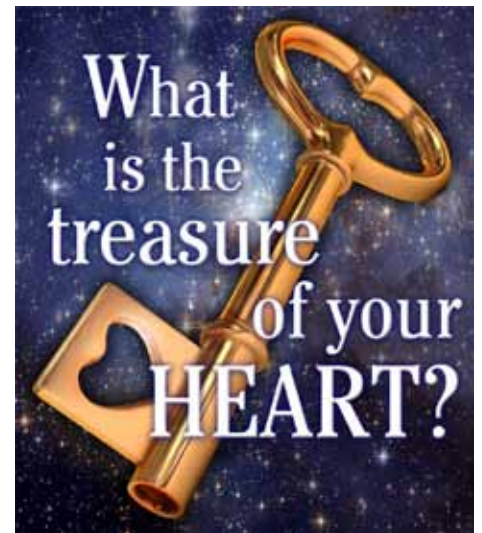

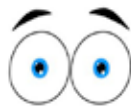

## CSA Thank You

Dear CSA Farmers,

Wow!! We have SO enjoyed our participation in the CSA this summer. When we think “participation,” we’re actually recalling all the great taste sensations we’ve enjoyed. We prepared a Mediterranean eggplant dish and used the garlic too. It was outstanding. We enjoyed Coal Miner’s Spaghetti using your incredible mushrooms; zucchini bread baked for Gary’s staff retreat (with more in the freezer for shelter guests); yummy fingerling potatoes; tomatoes with basil; and “fried” cabbage. In the freezer we already have carrots ready for vegetable beef soup this winter. We dehydrated the dill and will have both dill weed and dill seeds for cooking and baking; and we made the best-ever Green Goddess dressing with the basil and green onions. We had green beans with new potatoes and fresh peas with new potatoes (Gary’s favorite!). Dinner guests LOVED having fresh kohlrabi slices with dill dip and earlier this summer Kathy used the radishes and kale in an appetizer tray for a wedding shower. Thank you for making this opportunity available to us. We appreciate you and look forward to the seasons ahead.

Every Sunday morning since June 31, First Church families have taken home fresh produce provided weekly by our multi-cultural farmers. The good smells of the herbs often wafted up the stairs from our Food Pantry, and visitors to the lower level enjoyed the colorful displays of greens, tomatoes, peppers, berries, and a few more unusual items, like the snake gourd, tomatillos and baby bok choy.

Those families who became shareholders in this new CSA (Community-Supported Agriculture) enjoyed healthy food grown in a sustainable manner by local farmers from immigrant families. It was a chance to build community, and many people split shares with people they had not previously known. We also got to know Moua Yang and his wife, Meili, who delivered and set up the produce each week.

The farmers made generous donations of produce to the Pantry each week supplemented by several shares donated by First Church members. In addition, people donated items from their shares that they would not be able to use for themselves. We were then able to offer Pantry guests fresh produce in addition to the nonperishable items in the Pantry. The two coolers in the Food Pantry lobby are typically filled with produce on Sunday – enough for the week.

**are invited to participate in our end-of-season potluck meal on Sunday, October 30.** The farmers and their advisors from the Farley Center for Peace, Justice & Sustainability will be there to answer questions and hear suggestions for next season. ## Food Pantry Special Offering

Our First Church Food Pantry has grown in many ways this year. Our numbers have remained fairly level, but we see new families every day. This tells us that families use our pantry during their time of crisis, and are able to survive because we provide them with the most basic thing in life – food.

We have grown in numbers of volunteers, replacing some old friends whose schedules or life situations have changed and providing volunteer support for our new food ministries. Our pantry's food ministries have broadened in scope to include making and serving 50 snack bags and 50 sandwiches every weekday. Our volunteers continue to repackage large donations into family-size servings for products such as cheese, eggs and rice.

**Our First Church CSA (Community-Supported Agriculture) has provided a plentiful variety of fresh produce for pantry guests.** One woman returned to ask what “that wonderful green leafy produce” was that she got, because her kids loved it and wanted more – it was fresh spinach! Our pantry guests have also experienced (and loved) bok choy, tomatillos, kohlrabi, jalapeños, mustard greens, snake gourds and much more.

Our pantry volunteers unload our Food Bank deliveries and stock the pantry shelves on a daily basis. They also pick up and unload donations from other sources, such as the Community Action Coalition, government commodities, or our most recent Copp's Grocery donation.

**A lot of inspiring work is accomplished through the efforts and dedication of our First Church volunteers. But there would be no work to do without the commitment of our First Church donors, who provide the financial support necessary to maintain the volume of food needed and given out by our pantry. So far this year we have purchased and given out more than 47,000 pounds of food from the Food Bank.** We stretch our dollars by utilizing the Food Bank instead of retail outlets, but your dollars are still needed. **Your donations have fed almost 4,000 families so far this year – a total of more than 8,500 individuals, one-third of whom are children.** These numbers are sure to increase as the weather turns colder. Thank you from your Food Pantry volunteers and guests.

Our hope is that our food ministries will not be seen as “us” and “them,” but rather as an effort in which “we” are all joining together to stop hunger in our community.
