Musings

Recently FUMC staff and members of the church's councils took part in a workshop designed to give us a better understanding of our church's new ministry model, which includes the church's vision and strategies for incorporating that vision into our ministry areas. Having a clear vision is important for any organization wanting to work efficiently towards reaching its goals and First Church is no exception.

As I seek balance in my personal spiritual life I can see a similar advantage to clearly defining my own vision and framing a structure for living it out. It is easy to spend my days absorbed in the tasks at hand, while silently pushing my spiritual life to the side and ignoring the signals of my heart. This can lead to feeling "all bunched up" inside and disconnected from the things that make me feel alive. This passive, unstructured approach does not hold much potential for sustained spiritual growth.

In our Youth Program students question, reflect upon and discuss the many different ways to connect to God as they work on defining their individual spiritual identities. During the year they begin to construct the framework for a personal practice that will bring them peace and fulfillment as they walk more closely with God.

This should be an ongoing exercise for all of us. As we grow and evolve from our experiences in life, our spiritual understanding, our personal vision, should reflect this growth. Just having a vision is not enough, however; we must also define "strategic objectives" or practices that move us toward our goal. As our youth are learning, it is important for all of us to develop a plan for incorporating our own most effective practices into our daily lives.

Sometimes it seems easier to hold on to our comfortable, familiar beliefs than to expend the time and energy needed to bring our beliefs in line with our new life experiences. A regular practice of "re-visioning" our spiritual values and updating our spiritual practices can help us remain grounded in who we are while giving us confidence to grow toward who we want to be.

The Lyons Lecture 2011: Emilie Townes

Espousing a theology rooted in the collective experience of African American women, the powerful voice of this year's Lyons lecturer will cut across barriers of time, race, and gender to bring us a message not to be missed. Emilie M. Townes is an Associate Dean and Professor of African American Religion and Theology at Yale Divinity School. Her credentials include authorship of several books, including *In a Blaze of Glory: Womanist Spirituality as Social Witness*, and participation in many panels and colloquia.

Dr. Townes is our eighth Lyons lecturer, and joins such luminaries as John Dominic Crossan, Elaine Pagels, Karen Armstrong, James Forbes, Marcus Borg, Mahmoud Ayoub, and John Shelby Spong, who have graced us with their presence and wisdom in previous years.

The Lyons Lecture with Dr. Townes is set for Saturday, April 30, 2011. In the near future, an online registration form will be available on our church website at www.fumc.org. Seats for the program will be limited to the first 450 registrants, so register early. Alternatively, FUMC members and friends can send in the registration form they will receive, along with a brochure, via regular mail. Registration for the program includes two lectures and a boxed (catered) lunch. Childcare is available for a small additional cost.



Habitat – El Salvador Team Formed

The Habitat for Humanity team that will travel to El Salvador this April has taken shape. When seven people from First Church/Orchard Ridge UCC community and four from elsewhere in Wisconsin reach El Salvador, a volunteer from Cuba will join them, to round out the team. These 12 participants include three teenagers and five people who have been on previous Habitat trips to El Salvador.

The volunteer from Cuba is Jorge Felix from Guanabocoa Methodist Church outside Havana. His participation is subject to obtaining the necessary travel approvals. First Church people who visited Cuba last month and last June worked with Jorge on those trips and appreciate his photographic and movie making skills, which he will bring to the El Salvador trip.

The International Ministry Team gives a hearty thanks to the individual members of First Church and to the Outreach Council for their generous travel support for several team members from First Church. Sponsored by the ecumenical non-profit Churches' Center for Land and People (CCLP), Winter Farmers' Markets and Meals for Hope have taken place at various churches throughout the winter months. First Church bids farewell to winter with the last market of the season just as the calendar welcomes spring. Our market and meal will take place on Sunday, March 20 from 8:30-11:30 a.m. The meal will be in Fellowship Hall and market tables will be distributed throughout the Narthex and Fellowship Hall.

The mission of CCLP is to bring rural and urban communities together by developing and promoting relationships. 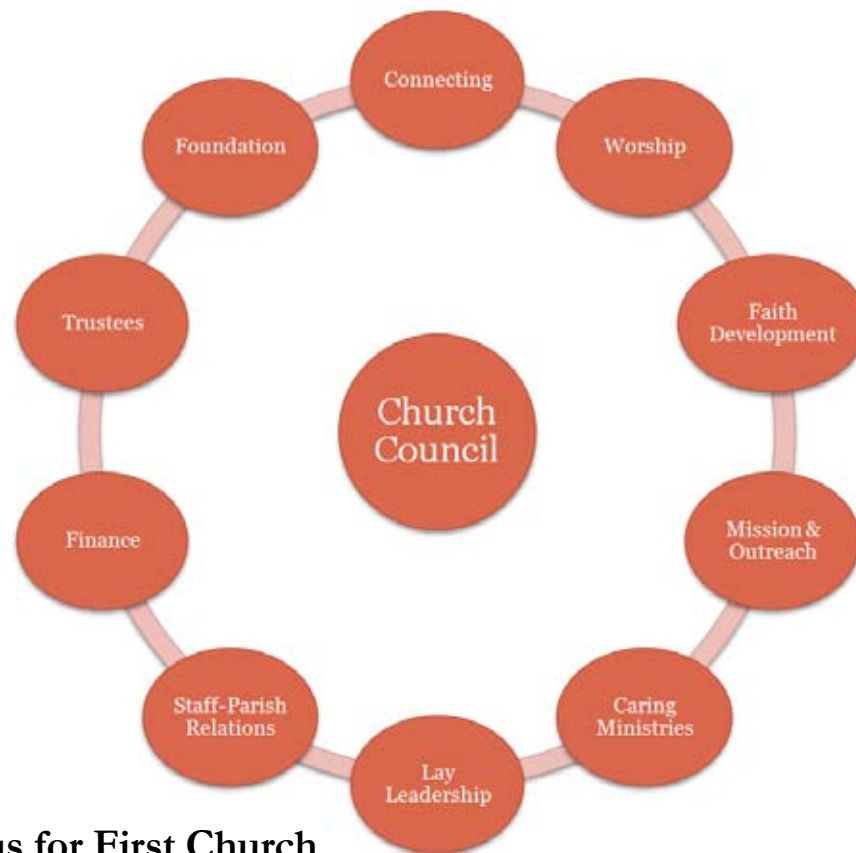
Introducing the Church Council

What Is Its Purpose and Who Are Its Members?

As in most United Methodist Churches today, the group of leaders known as the Church Council convene on a regular basis to make decisions on behalf of the congregation. Specifically, the Council's job is to:

- Articulate mission and vision
- Set overall priorities for ministry and commit needed resources
- Provide oversight, encouragement, recognition and accountability
- Model the congregation's vision of partnership in ministry

Administrative committees and program councils relate to the Church Council. The leaders of these groups bring questions and ideas from group members to the Council. At FUMC the structure looks like this:



Strategic Focus for First Church

In addition to mission and vision, the Council has established three areas of strategic focus for the next few years:

- To encourage and grow an environment of radical hospitality in attitude as well as action, following Jesus' example of gracious invitation to all and full inclusion and acceptance of those who respond to the invitation.
- To take advantage of new Web tools and other computer and communication technologies as resources to support ministry, so that more people can be aware of opportunities, participate (even from remote locations), and connect with each other.
- Establish programs to identify, develop, and support church leaders, both in our ministry groups and teams and in church-wide committees, as we grow closer to our vision of partnership in ministry.

People of Faith United for Justice – Tuesday, March 15

In the Spring of 2009 Rev. Tina Lang and several members of our congregation participated in the biennial Advocacy Day at the Capitol. The 2011 event is scheduled for Tuesday, March 15. Members and friends interested in learning, discussing, praying and advocating together for social justice issues are invited to participate. The day is sponsored by several faith-based organizations, including the Wisconsin Council of Churches and Madison Area Urban Ministry. It is a day-long event that allows people of faith to participate in shaping public policy that reflects the values of our religious communities: justice, compassion, stewardship and hope.

The day's events will begin at Bethel Lutheran Church, just across the street from our own church building, with a 10 a.m. keynote address by Bishop Bruce Burnside of the South-Central Synod of Wisconsin Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The keynote address will be followed by break-out sessions and lunch at the church. At 1:30 p.m. the gathering will move to the Capitol for a rally and 2 p.m. visits with various legislators.
