Pastor Schroerlucke continues our Lenten theme of *Life in the Garden* with a message titled, "New Eyes to See the Garden" based on John 3:1-17. At the 9:30 service, we will celebrate the Sacrament of Holy Baptism and at the 11:00 Worship in the Chapel the New Choir will offer their gift of song. In addition, at both the 9:30 and 11:00 services, cast members of "The Secret Garden" will share a musical selection from the upcoming production.

Recent Church Council Actions

Approval of Financing Plan for HVAC and Landscaping

At a February 15 meeting, the Council authorized use of the Building Fund for the upcoming replacement of HVAC units serving the sanctuary and older part of the building. This will add approximately \$100,000 to the building debt. In addition, the Council authorized use of the Building Fund for the landscaping project currently in the planning stage. The final scope and budget for that project are yet to be finalized by the Trustees and Council. If you have questions or concerns about this action, please send email to Council@fumc.org.

2011 Budget Approved

At a special meeting on January 16, the Church Council adopted the 2011 Operating Budget, with revenues estimated at \$941,300 and expenditures totaling \$941,062. Development of this budget began with a Saturday morning workshop in October 2010, where each administrative committee and program council presented their budget request and plans for 2011. The Finance Committee developed revenue estimates and fine-tuned the expenditures in order to create the final budget. 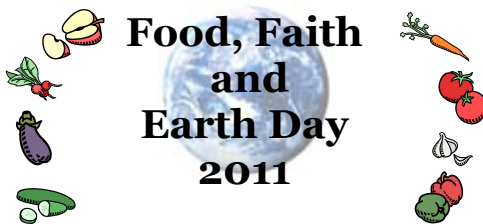

Foundation Grant

For many years, our congregation has been effectively engaged in a variety of ministries related to helping our neighbors care for their basic needs. Outreach Ministries are central to our congregation's identity and mission. In addition to that outreach focus, our long-standing commitment to offering high quality music ministries has made us a "magnet" for many who appreciate Fine Arts. Throughout the Lenten season, we will be offering several ministry initiatives that combine best practices of our Outreach Ministries with best

practices of our Fine Arts Ministries in order to provide Fine Arts opportunities specifically designed to include members of the community who don't often have access to those opportunities. Our goal is to engage people from different life experiences with one another in spiritually uplifting events. We believe that genuine relationships will begin to develop between members of our congregation and members of the larger community when we come together to experience some of the joys of community life together. FUMC's Foundation is helping make this pilot program possible through the gift of a generous grant. Funds from the Foundation will help provide for:

- Copies of the book, *The Secret Garden* to be distributed to families who are guests of our Food Pantry and Sunday school families (study and discussion guides are included).
- Tickets for performances of the musical, "The Secret Garden" to be distributed to several families who are guests of our Food Pantry and families engaging in other community-assistance programs.
- Tickets for the March 20 Meal for Hope to be distributed to several Food Pantry families and individuals.
- Produce from farmers participating in the March 20 Farmers' Market to be shared with Food Pantry guests.
- A temporary art gallery in the Chapel titled "Garden Conversations: A Photographic Essay".
- Filming of narratives from the book *Seed Folks* illustrating the creation of community among diverse individuals.

• Packets of seeds (for growing herbs) to be distributed to all guests who visit our building during Lent.

The vision for this Fine Arts Outreach ministry initiative is grand and yet to be fully determined, but we trust that there is much to be learned during the pilot projects of this Lenten season. And we trust that everything we learn will help our congregation move more fully into our commitment to extend radical hospitality. Thank you to our Foundation for their generous support of this and so many other ministry initiatives.

Celebrate the First Day of Spring at the Farmers' Market and Meal for Hope – Sunday, March 20

On March 20, from 8:30 – 11 a.m., we will find the Octagon and Fellowship Hall transformed into a market with a wide variety of locally-grown or produced goods for sale. Browse the stalls and then sample the products for yourself at a meal served all morning in Fellowship Hall. Prices are \$10 for adults and \$6 for seniors and children. A portion of the proceeds and farmers' products will be donated to our Food Pantry.

FUMC March Outreach Ministries Focus: Habitat for Humanity

First Church's Housing Ministry and International Ministry teams continue to actively participate in local and international Habitat for Humanity projects, and these ministries will be holding their joint annual fund raiser for these projects on March 20 and 27, 2011.

Our Habitat Projects

The current local project is Habitat for Humanity of Dane County's Urban Neighborhood Initiative. Under this initiative, houses are under construction in the Twin Oaks and Northport Commons sites, and a home is being renovated on Taft Street. First Church volunteers have been hard at work at these sites.

The International Ministry Team's current focus is on the micro entrepreneurship component of the Strengthening the Getsemani Community Project. This component is one of six initiatives to help this community in Ahucahapán, El Salvador engage in holistic community development. Activities under the micro entrepreneurship component in 2011 will focus on providing financial management and basic business skills training to community members who are starting their own small businesses. Later this year a microfinance fund will be established under this component.

Partners in the project include Getsemani's community leaders, Habitat for Humanity El Salvador, Thrivent Builds, and various North American churches. See the blog at <http://habitatelsalvador.wordpress.com/> for details on the community and this project.



Fund Raising and In-Kind Donations

The combined goal for this fund raising is \$19,400. Of this total, \$10,000 will go to the Urban Neighborhood Initiative and \$9,400 to the micro entrepreneurship component of the Getsemani community project. \$2,770 has already been pledged to the micro entrepreneurship component, including a \$1,000 challenge grant for new donations, leaving a total of \$16,630 yet to be raised.

A pledge envelope for this fund raiser is enclosed with this Chimes, and additional envelopes will be included with church bulletins the next two Sundays. (We're recycling old envelopes to save printing costs.) Contributions and pledges may be placed in the Sunday morning offering plate or mailed to the church office. Online donations can be made at First Church's website, with the notation that the contribution is for "Habitat projects."

We are also seeking in-kind donations of professional construction services, such as plumbing, HVAC, and electrical work, for Habitat projects in Dane County. These donations will count towards our support of the Urban Neighborhood Initiative.

Register Now for Lyons Lecture on Saturday, April 30



With the ongoing political turmoil in our state, literally at the doorstep of FUMC, the 2011 Lyons Lecturer may be just the right person for us at this

historic moment. Dr. Emilie Townes, the Mellon Professor of African American Religion at Yale University, has remarked, "Jesus was a guy who knew how to get angry, understood the full meaning of righteous indignation, and when he saw less than what was acceptable...he got upset and acted out about it. There are moments when you have to voice the injustice... you can't mince words about it...you can't be politically correct about it... you can't be pastoral about it, you have to call a sin a sin and be willing to take the consequences."

Among her many publications are *Breaking the Fine Rain of Death: African American Health and a Womanist Ethic of Care; Womanist Justice, Womanist Hope; In a Blaze of Glory: Womanist Spirituality as Social Witness*. Being womanist means emphasizing the particularity of the African American experience and how it can inform relationships, spirituality, theology, and our understandings of liberation and social justice.

Dr. Townes will be giving two presentations, the first on "Doubt and Hope" at 10 a.m., and the second on "Faithful Citizenship" at 1 p.m. Doors to the church open at 9 a.m. A boxed lunch will be offered between the lectures.
