Musings

I have so enjoyed reading the Lenten Meditations. The parables about your garden experiences have both inspired me and left me with a feeling of deep peace. I am thankful for these daily blessings.

It seems like the garden theme resonated with many of us. The Outreach Council also talked gardening last week - in the growing and eating sense. Our guests were Jay Salinas and Moua Yang from the Farley Center for Peace, Justice and Sustainability. The Center works with immigrant farmers, providing land as well as technical assistance. Immigrant farmers have few outlets for their products other than farmers' markets, which do not usually provide a predictable source of income. So the Farley Center is helping Hmong and Latino farm families become a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) cooperative.

First Church has agreed to sponsor the new CSA beginning this summer. Both full and split-shares will soon be available for purchase by FUMC members and friends. Each Sunday after worship, shareholders will be able to take home their weekly share of the garden's bounty - fresh, healthy food direct from the garden. The participating farm families get a lump sum of income to help with large purchases (like tractors), and greater financial security from the guaranteed seasonal income. And the CSA co-op will donate one share to our food pantry for every ten purchased.

A major advantage to the CSA co-op for shareholders is the variety of produce received from four different farms instead of only one. This CSA co-op, in particular, will provide added interest with the inclusion of culture-specific vegetables (recipes provided!) from the Hmong and Latino farms.

What I love about the collaboration between this new co-op and our church is how it fits our yearning for living simply and supporting values of sustainability, cooperation, stewardship and intentionality. Here is an opportunity to ease the struggles of our neighbors while challenging our world-view, making new friends and continuing to define radical hospitality.

From farm families to church families to food pantry families - imagine the number of people who will be affected positively by this collaborative project as they eat and enjoy good, fresh food.

Send us family photos, help lead worship, share your music and more...

Beginning on Pentecost Sunday, June 12, our church will focus on “Celebrating God’s Family” as we learn from one another what it is to be “family”. We know many of you change your schedules in summer as school is out, vacations are taken and outdoor activities fill our weekends. First Church’s Sunday summer schedule will change too:

8:00 to 8:45 a.m. – Early Worship

8:30 to 9:15 a.m. – Breakfast for everyone (Freewill offering)

8:30 to 9:30 a.m. – Coffee Fellowship

9:30 to 10:30 a.m. – Worship

9:30 to 10:30 a.m. – Summer Sunday School

There will be no 11 a.m. worship service during the summer weeks from June 12 through September 4. We will return to our three worship hours on September 11 with the beginning of our fall program year. We hope this summer schedule will allow for community building and more intentional fellowship.

Help us “Celebrate God’s Family” by your participation:

1. **Provide photos for worship.** Would you be willing to provide photos of your family that could be shown on the large screen before worship, during the offertory or during coffee fellowship? They might be photos of a family vacation or just photos showing your family members. We can take care of formatting the pictures for the screen and adding the names, if you provide that information. This might help us get better acquainted and learn more about our church families. If these photos are in a digital format, you can email them to office@fumc.org with the appropriate information. You can

also drop off actual photos with accompanying information so we can scan them and return the photos to you. Be creative in choosing the photos. How about a baby picture next to a present time photo? It could be a photo of a loved one no longer with us. Help us learn about each other by participating in this effort.

2. **Help with Sunday worship.** Would your family be willing to offer some leadership during Sunday worship? We are particularly interested in demonstrating the variety of family relationships and models that call First Church their church home. We would welcome your participation as liturgists and readers during worship. Involve the whole family. This might be: Parent and adult child; parents with adopted children; a step-parent family; a grandparent and grandchild; an aunt and a special niece; a single person and a next door neighbor; a newlywed couple; a couple who have been together for 60 years; two fathers and a child; siblings who share life together; a family with a special pet to share during the Children’s Time (sorry no goats) and many more.

3. **Offer your musical talents.** Scott Foss, our music director, will be looking for families to share special music during worship. It could be a mother and daughter playing instruments, a family singing, two sisters playing a piano duet, or any number of family configurations willing to share a musical piece during the summer at one or both worship hours.

4. **Come Downtown for Good Cookin’.** Our breakfast menus on Sunday morning will include family recipes from our church cookbook and some favorites of our kitchen coordinator, Bobbi Reynolds. Copies

of the church cookbooks will be available for you to take home. Bobbi will need help in the kitchen and would welcome your participation.

5. **Tell your story.** We would love to have stories of interest about families. We have heard of families reunited after many years; previously unknown relatives who were discovered through the internet; couples who found each other through unique experiences; stories around adoption; births; and other stories unique to your family. These can be short stories and will be shared in special additions to the *Chimes*.

For any of this to happen, we will need your support, cooperation and participation. So get busy NOW and find those photographs, write down that story, pull together a special musical piece and offer your willingness to serve as liturgist during a worship service. Update from Reconciling Ministry Team: Rev. Amy DeLong Trial Rescheduled

After the sudden cancellation of the April trial date for Rev. Amy DeLong because the church did not have a church counsel or a presiding officer to oversee the trial, a new date of June 21-23 has been set. The trial will take place at Peace UMC, Kaukauna, one week after the meeting of the Wisconsin Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. Bishop Clay Lee will be the presiding officer and Rev. Thomas Lambrecht will be the church counsel. It should be noted that Rev. Lambrecht is a board member of Good News, a group that openly opposes any change in status of the church's "don't ask, don't tell" policy restricting full-participation in the church for gay clergy or laity.

The trial cancellation and subsequent delay of any resolution of Amy's status within the church have only added to the substantial cost of Amy's defense.
