Rethinking Leadership: Empowering Ministry

The Church Council has decided to explore a new and innovative model for leadership at a workshop led by Dan Hotchkiss.

All members who have been or would like to be active in ministry are invited to participate and share their thoughts and reactions.

For many years, being active in the life of a United Methodist Church went hand in hand with serving on one or more church committees. During the past decade, FUMC has gradually reduced the number of committees and has simplified our lay leadership structure.

Last year the church council spent time thinking about how we make decisions that address the need for change. We realized that our current structure and processes work well when we are doing the same things year after year, but do not help us with decision-making and implementation of needed changes or new initiatives.

It turns out that we are not the only church struggling with these issues. Pastor Keith and I attended a seminar over a year ago, taught by Dan Hotchkiss of the Alban Institute (a nondenominational center of learning and leadership development with a focus on congregations). Dan has made a study of congregations that have successfully navigated change and growth, from which he developed a new model for structuring congregational leadership and processes. This model, drawn from the best practices of nonprofit organizations and churches, empowers people to do ministry without complex and time-consuming committee processes. Hotchkiss' innovative model emphasizes a broadly inclusive and transparent process for making big decisions and a more nimble and efficient process for making the smaller, routine decisions.

Sing-Along for Porchlight Saturday, May 17, 7 p.m. in Fellowship Hall



Last fall, the Homelessness Task Force led a congregational examination of mental illness and how it impacts homelessness. There was a movie night (“Minds on the Edge”), a concert and fundraiser, a four-week adult education series on mental illness, and a Mental Health Sunday that included dramatic presentations by Forward Theater, special music, and a sermon regarding mental illness.

I was honored to have been a part of this effort. In addition to attending planning meetings and many of the events, I also had the opportunity to present the fourth session of adult education and give a “mission moment” address during all three worship services on Mental Health Sunday. My topic was the role of faith communities. I was asked to discuss how persons of faith can help and advocate for persons with mental illness. I drew on my own 23 years of major depression with recurring episodes.

As a follow-up to our focus on mental health, and to celebrate my 60th birthday, I decided to host a fundraiser for Porchlight’s Safe Haven program, which provides temporary housing and support services for homeless men and women with mental illness. Safe Haven offers basic services as well as a psychiatric clinic. For many clients, Safe Haven is the entry to medical care and the community service system.

Our Outreach Coordinator, Susan Jeannette, our Director of Music, Scott Foss, and the Homelessness Task Force have helped me plan this event, which will take place in Fellowship Hall on Saturday, May 19 from 7 - 9:30 p.m. Those of you who have attended my caroling parties will recognize the format. We will gather, sing, break for treats, come back and sing some more. With lyrics and piano accompaniment provided, the audience selects their favorites.

During our refreshment break, Porchlight will show a short video about their services, including the new building for Safe Haven. Porchlight’s commercial kitchen, which provides job training and employment for homeless persons, will provide catering. Porchlight Products will be available for purchase. People who have used Porchlight’s services will be available for conversation about what these programs have meant to them.

How can you help? Later on, I will encourage you to consider a donation of some sort. But for now, you can put this date on your calendar, and send me your suggestions for songs of courage, hope, recovery, and celebration. Forums on Recent Habitat Build in El Salvador

Team members from the February 2012 Habitat for Humanity trip to El Salvador will share stories and photos of their experiences from their travels.

College Mission Trip to Koinonia Partners in Georgia (May 21-May 28/29)

The Koinonia trip is a unique mission opportunity that will focus on experiences to learn about social justice and community – what it means to us and how to apply it to where we live. Along with pivotal stops in Louisville and Atlanta, the experiences range from Habitat builds and urban soup kitchens to rural community living. Middle School Mission Trip – Su Casa, June 20-24 (Chicago)

Su Casa Catholic Worker Community takes in Spanish-speaking homeless families of Chicago, many of whom are women and children escaping domestic violence. The workers in the house commit to various kinds of volunteerism for various amounts of time, bringing new energy and ideas to the house. Su Casa works to restore and liberate the humanity of the whole Community. Our youth group will experience living in their community, sharing their meals and their work, which might include helping in their daycare center, assisting in maintenance issues around the building and helping sort items in their food pantry. And of course, the group will find time to tour around Chicago.

High School Mission Trip – Appalachia Service Project, July 21-29 (Kentucky)

The Appalachia Service Project (ASP) provides a rewarding, structured service opportunity, bringing thousands of volunteers from around the country to rural Central Appalachia to repair homes for low-income families. But ASP is more than just a building program. It creates opportunities to get to know the family whose home you are repairing and build relationships with people from another culture and place. The days are spent repairing houses, which might include building porches, replacing flooring, or installing insulation. The range of evening activities includes large group devotions, culture nights, or a picnic with all the families. For many, this trip is the highlight of our youth program.
