Musings

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. (Genesis 1:1-3)

Scripture tells us that God spoke not just light, but all of creation into being. That's a powerful voice speaking a powerful story! And it's a storytelling process that continues with our participation. God's beloved children take part in telling the story of creation and God's all-encompassing love and as we participate the story becomes our own. We are the storytellers and we are the living characters in the story. Our dual roles mean that we have significant opportunity to shape the story. What a gift! What a responsibility!

As members and friends of FUMC, what is the story we tell? What do we have to say to the world about who we believe God is, how we believe God calls us to interact with one another, and what we believe we have to offer the world as individuals and as a community of faith? Do we have a compelling story/vision that we are able to tell not just with our words but with the actions of our daily living?

In a world of carefully scripted sound bites, slick marketing, and intentionally deceptive half-truths, it's easy to get lost in the emptiness of mindless chatter or to wish we could just tune-out. While it's true that talk can be cheap, the creation story in Genesis 1 (and so much else in our book of sacred stories) reminds us that talk can also be holy.

This fall members and friends of FUMC will engage together in holy talk: the process of remembering, telling, creating and embodying life-giving stories that celebrate God's activity in the world and our call to participate in that activity. Each of our individual stories is important and helps enliven the larger narrative shared by our community so please plan to participate in a variety of worship, learning, community-building and service opportunities this fall. We're about to open a new chapter of this grace-filled, marvelous story of life. I hope you'll come to receive from and contribute to this powerful story.

Outreach In Action: Helping Neighbors In Need

August was a busy month for Outreach Ministries, connecting new volunteers and helping our neighbors in downtown Madison. Highlights included hosting our fifth Foot Care Clinic for the Homeless led by Madison Area Care for the Homeless (MACH). We served 20 individuals with the help of 28 volunteers including doctors, nurses, medical students and hospitality volunteers.

We expanded our Adopt-A-Block team to help keep our neighborhood clean and safe. This program is a partnership with the City of Madison and Downtown Madison, Inc. (DMI). We are celebrating one year with this program. Volunteers not only do good work in our church's neighborhood, but also get to know our neighbors at the same time.
