More than four years after the devastating earthquake displaced these people from their homes, they are still searching for permanent shelter and a safe space to recreate their community. On October 19, we welcome Madison resident, Mike Nowakowski, who spends winter months in the southern Arizona desert volunteering with Green Valley Samaritans, a program that conducts searches for migrants lost, hungry, dehydrated, or in any way in need of human aid. THEOLOGY FOR THE 21ST CENTURY

This group concludes Victor Frankl's book, Man's Search for Meaning on October 5 and begins a new book on October 12. Hal Taussig, the 2015 Lyons Lecture presenter is the author of several books. Through the rest of October this class will read and discuss A New New Testament: A Bible for the 21st Century Combining Traditional and Newly Discovered Texts. In the book, Taussig, with help from a council of scholars, has compiled a new testament with 10 "new" books from first and second century sources. Each "new" book is prefaced with an essay explaining the context and history of its writing and why that book was included. A study guide included with the book will prompt interesting discussions.
